ID Requirements for your appointment

The Notary will require you to produce by way of formal identification

- ✓ Your **original passport**, or, if you do not hold a passport, **original current photocard driving licence** and any other means of ID specifically referred to in the documentation

Together with 1 of the following – addressed to you at your home and dated within the last 3 months

- ✓ Original utility bill (gas, electricity, water or landline-telephone)
- ✓ Original current account bank statement

For a director appearing before the Notary on behalf of a company Mrs Dhariwal will require to see proof of the authority of that person to bind the company, together with the company's Certificate of Incorporation and Constitution (or the Company registered number so that she can obtain that data online from Companies House herself).

However please contact Mrs Dhariwal to discuss the matter in detail, as further documentation may be required, depending on the notarial service requested.

Types of Documents commonly notarised for corporate and commercial clients:

Notarisation of the execution of Company / Corporate Powers of Attorney

The completion of formalities for various jurisdictions requires knowledge of the legal requirements for execution. Mrs Dhariwal is familiar with the Companies Act 2006 and will advise accordingly to ensure execution is valid.

Providing Notarisation of Certificates of Incorporation or Articles of Association for UK or Foreign Companies

Please note that we will require copies of foreign company incorporation documents where foreign companies are involved

Notarised Certificates of Good Standing

From the Companies Registration office for England & Wales (Companies House)

Certification of Identity of Directors, Secretaries and other Company Officers

This can be required for many overseas (or UK) organisations to set up a branch or for EU tenders, for example

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Notarising the execution of Commercial Contracts for International Use

Authenticating Documents to assist in the opening of Corporate Branch offices or Bank Accounts in or outside of the United Kingdom

Notarising Commercial Mortgages for International Finance

Authenticating the parties to UK and International Music Contracts

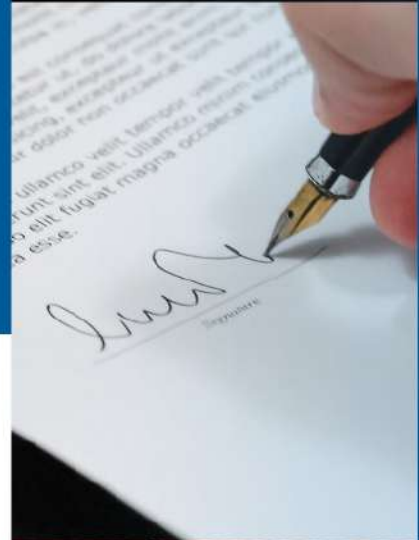
Providing Certificates to authenticate Intellectual Property Rights in Music, the Performing Arts and / or Television Rights

Notarising Statements in Support of Copyright Infringements Worldwide

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What is a Notary Public?

Notaries in England hold Public Office and are the oldest of the legal professions



As well as being lawyers, Notaries must possess a Diploma in Notarial Practice and have satisfied the Faculty Office of The Archbishop of Canterbury that they are fit and proper persons to be awarded a faculty to practise.

What services does a Notary provide?

It is the impartiality of the Notary and the process of authentication which is carried out by the Notary as certified by the Notary's signature and seal which enables worldwide recognition.



Where appropriate the Notary ensures the requirements of English law are observed in the execution of documents, in addition to the formalities stipulated to the Notary by the foreign country to which the document is to be sent.

The integrity and impartiality of the Office of Notary are specifically recognised under the English Supreme Court Rules which provide that a notarial act produced in court as evidence is automatically presumed to be the truth of the facts the Notary certifies, unless the contrary is proved otherwise.

Where does the office of Notary Public come from?

Notaries Public (also called "notaries", "notarial officers", or "public notaries") hold an office which can trace its origins back to ancient Rome, when they were called scribes ("scribe"), tabellius ("writer"), or notarius ("notary"). The history of Notaries is set out in detail in Chapter 1 of Brooke's Notary (12th edition):

"The office of a public notary is a public office. It has a long and distinguished history. The office has its origin in the civil institutions of ancient Rome. Public officials, called scribes, that is to say, scribes, rose in rank from being mere copiers and transcribers to a learned profession prominent in private and public affairs. Some were permanent officials attached to the Senate and courts of law whose duties were to record public proceedings, transcribe state papers, supply magistrates with legal forms, and register the decrees and judgments of magistrates."
